Art is all around us! From public art, to galleries, to opportunities to get creative yourself, explore Art Around Town in the Ambleside neighbourhood.



CLUE 1: ART MUSEUM | WEST VANCOUVER 680 17TH ST, WEST VANCOUVER

The West Vancouver Art Museum celebrates and fosters awareness of the art, architecture and design that has helped shape our community, region and country. They do this through publications, educational programmes and dynamic exhibitions. How inspiring!

But what was this building before it was an art museum? It was house that belonged to a local elementary school teacher! Teaching was one of the few professions available to women at the time and the owner purchased the property in 1929 and was one of the earliest women in the province to take out a loan. Her house reflected her values and interests – she designed it with her parents' old age in mind and asked her female school teachers to help design and build it. She had a keen interest in the arts, including music, Scottish dancing, and visual art. She included a large living room which she made sure was big enough to host many evenings of Scottish dancing. The space makes for a perfect art gallery today!

CLUE 2: SILK PURSE 1570 ARGYLE AVENUE

The Silk Purse is an art centre run by the West Vancouver Community Arts Council and the building itself is on the District of West Vancouver's Community Heritage Register. The Silk Purse was originally a summer cottage built in the 1920s. Before the Lions Gate Bridge was built, there were lots of houses lined up here along the shoreline - can you picture it? In the 1970s, the owner filled the house with antiques and rented it out as a 'honeymoon cottage'. During the renovation, one of his sons remarked that he was "...trying to make a silk purse out of a sow's ear", and the name stuck! More than 50 newlywed couples spent the night there. For only \$12 a night, they got a night's stay, a bottle of champagne, a sketch of the building, and a fridge full of food!

On the west side of the building there are some colourful murals by Richard Tetrault depicting marine activity and musical events programmed by the West Vancouver Arts Council.

CLUE 5: FERRY BUILDING
1414 ARGYLE AVENUE

The Ferry Building has been a centre of activity for over 100 years but why is it called the Ferry Building? Prior to the construction of the Lionsgate Bridge, a ferry ran between downtown Vancouver and Ambleside. The building was constructed in 1913 in order to provide a place to buy tickets and wait for ferries. In 1987, the building received heritage designation and since 1989 this public gallery has supported the development of emerging and established artists from the North Shore, the Sea-to-Sky Corridor and the Sunshine Coast. The Ferry Building Gallery presents art lectures, tours and programs that reflect the cultural diversity of the North Shore. CLUE 6: SQUAMISH WELCOME FIGURE
AMBLESIDE PARK, BEACH GROUYNE

This welcome figure was carved at Mosquito Creek Marina from an old growth cedar tree from Cypress Mountain. The welcome figure is a West Vancouver landmark and is a gift from the Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw (Squamish Nation), marking K'aya'chtn (gathering of ocean canoes). In honour of the teachings and wisdom of the Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw grandmothers, the sculpture fosters respect for the land, animals, and people that occupy it.

CLUE 7: SALMON SPINDLE WHORL
1200 PARK ROYAL S (OUTSIDE PARK ROYAL - SOUTH ENTRANCE)

A spindle whorl is a traditional Salish hand-spinning tool used to turn animal and bast fibers into yarn for weaving. This yarn was then used to create ceremonial regalia and woven blankets. The designs of salmon found on this piece by Jody Broomfield represent the circle of life with four different salmon species (Chinook, Coho, Chum, and Pink). The salmon that swim up Xwemelch'stn are of the utmost importance. Their rich nutrients and abundance in numbers have fed the Skwxwú7mesh people of the land for thousands of years and continue to do so. On the edges of the whorl are the sacred eyes of ancestors, watching over in all four directions.
